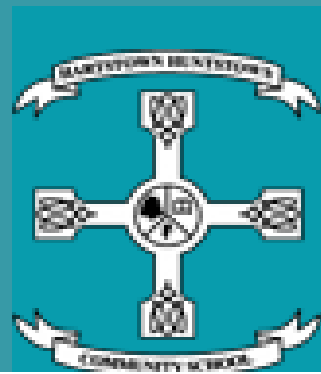

The School Community were delighted to hear the wonderful news that Vanessa Mordi, one of our recent 2017 Graduates, has been awarded an All-Ireland Scholarship for her excellent Leaving Certificate results.

This much coveted scholarship is awarded to the best one hundred eligible Leaving Certificate Students in the country each year. The top two students from each of the thirty two counties and the remainder of the top one hundred leaving certificate performers receive a grant of almost €7000 for every year of college. Vanessa has accepted a place in Trinity College Dublin to study Dental Science for the next five years.

The All Ireland Scholarship was initiated by J.P. McManus and is administered by the Department of Education and Science.

Vanessa's excellent Leaving Certificate included H1's (over 90% in a higher level subject) in four

subjects: English, Home Economics, Chemistry and French.

We know how diligent Vanessa was throughout her time here and we wish her every success and happiness in her academic career.

On Friday the 8th of September the school hosted an Award Ceremony for the best Leaving Certificate Students of 2017. The top twelve HCS performers in the Leaving Certificate and the two best from LCA were invited back to school with their parents.

We organize this annual event to formally recognise the dedication shown by the students who reached a very high standard in their Leaving Certificate exams. These students made real sacrifices and committed fully to realising their potential. They were presented with certificates and bursaries towards their further education. It is also hoped that our fifth and sixth year students would be inspired by our winners from our award winners to achieve their academic potential.

Transition year 2017 2018

Transition Year has a total of four classes. We have at present over eighty students enrolled in the year. This year's programme includes established programmes unique to TY like Yoga, photography, fencing, ballroom dancing, as well as our couch to 5k programme. We also have psychology as a subject as well as art appreciation.

Internet safety day: We have had a full internet safety day on the 11th of September with Zeeko.ie. The day focused on the challenges facing adolescents as regards their use of the internet and social media

Draocht Theatre project: Our very successful collaboration with Draocht had its first run on Friday the 16th where we welcomed back Eimear Morrissey to hold a full one day theatre workshop. Many thanks again to Mr Keane and the English dept. for all of their work on this valuable project

Future Learning project: We will be participating in a Future Learning Project in Trinity College and any student that is interested in attending this should talk to Mr. Wade. This proved very successful last year and will take place from the 3rd to the 6th October this year and places are limited to ten students.

Work experience: TY students should always be on the lookout for interesting work experience placements. The Defence Forces as well as the Garda Síochána have some



really good programmes worth investigating. The Irish Times run an annual competition for work experience placements. It is always worthwhile if parents and family can help with placements for students.

Garda Vetting: E-Vetting for TY Students: Section 12 of the Vetting Act 2016 places a statutory obligation on school authorities to obtain a vetting disclosure from the Bureau prior to the employment, contract, permission or placement of a person to undertake relevant work or activities with children or vulnerable persons. This applies to all students aged over 16.

As some of our TY students may do work experience in a Primary school, an early years setting or in community care with vulnerable adults, they must go through the e vetting process once they reach the age of 16 at the time of the placement. If your son or daughter intends to work in this area he/she must see Mr. Wade immediately in order to begin the e vetting process.

SPHE Talking Topics – Ms N. Clince

As we are all aware, there is a huge emphasis being placed on the area of wellbeing in conjunction with the new junior cycle. In light of this, we have introduced a weekly "Talking Topic". This is a topic of discussion that each student in our school will be exposed to on a weekly basis in their tutorial group, this topic can also be integrated into their SPHE/CSPE class accordingly. A timetable of "Talking Topics" will be e-mailed to the staff on a monthly basis. It is hoped that this will create an awareness among our students, and encourage them to engage in active discussion among their peers, and at home. It is also hoped that these discussions will lead to active, and informed decision making by our students which in turn will have a positive

effect on their wellbeing.

Literacy Initiatives - Mr. J Horseman

The DEAR (Drop Everything And Read) timetable is available in each student's journal. Students should bring in a book from home which they can read during this class period. If any student is unsure about what type of book they might be reading, they should consult with their English teacher who could put forward some suggestions. The purpose of DEAR is to encourage students to read books for enjoyment and to improve general literacy levels.

The Peer reading initiative is designed to assist students who may struggle with reading. They are partnered with a Transition Year student who assists them in improving their reading levels. We will be starting the training with the Transition Year students' shortly. Second year students will be involved before Christmas and students from First year will be involved after Christmas.

Maths Club - Ms J. Reilly

Maths club takes place Monday to Thursday from 3.20-4.00pm in H13. It's a drop in service open to all year groups with a high ratio of experienced teachers to students. We are giving students the opportunity to complete Maths homework and raise their levels in preparation for the state and end of term exam.

25 Years at Hartstown CS

A warm welcome back to the all members of the school community in this, our 25th anniversary year. From small beginnings in 1992 of 86 students and 8 teachers, Hartstown Community School has gone from strength to strength. We now have 1130 students and over 80 teachers. We now have one of the most diverse populations of any school in Ireland, something which contributes greatly to our open, respectful ethos.

Changes to HCS - Ms Marie Keane

The school opened its doors in September, 1992 and I started my job in Hartstown Community School in October of that year. There was no school built at this time only a building called the annex which contained six classrooms, what a difference from today.

The next year the prefabs were built which contained more classrooms, the science labs along with the home economics rooms. The upstairs of the building along with the rest of the school was not completely built until two to three years later.

In 2016 the new building attached to the

school was in the process of being built and this building was completed in August of this year.

During my 25 years working in the school I have had three children attend the school along with my granddaughter.

Last August I came to school to see the completion of the new building. With new floors laid, painting completed and furniture in place you could see how impressive the new extension would be. This visit reminded me of the first time I came to HCS, it was the same week in August but exactly 25 years earlier.

Changes to HCS - Ms M.Berreen

In August 1992 there was a section of the permanent building almost ready, the Annex building was getting the final touches for the opening of the first ever school year. It was an impressive building even at that early stage and the culmination of many years of dedicated planning.

I returned a week later and joined the small staff for the start of the first school year along with 86 students full of excitement and anticipation for the year to come. I was excited to be involved in planning and equipping the new Home Economics room. The following year a number of classrooms in the new building were ready and over the subsequent years the number of staff and students grew to fill them. In a short time we became a team of three Home Economics teachers as Ms. Killoran and Ms.Giblin joined the staff.

There were outstanding facilities for teaching and learning and the students were soon involved in a vast array of extra-curricular activities provided by the growing staff. I remember we brought entire year groups on school tours to Clare and the Burren area. Subsequent tours were organised to include trips to London, Paris, Germany and Barcelona. In the years that followed the students and staff were involved in the production of a variety of great Musicals and an extensive Night School developed providing a huge range of courses to the locality.

In recent years some of my students are now sons and daughters of former students and we have a number of past pupils who have returned to our staff. Looking forward to the next chapter in the life of HCS.

Creating the sidebar thermometer charts

When you work in Word 2010 (or PowerPoint 2010), you have the full power of Excel 2010 charts (provided that Excel is installed on your computer). Insert a chart in Word from the Insert tab, in the Illustrations group.

However, notice in the sidebar at left that the "thermometer charts" were created using single-row Word tables. This is because they automatically fit the tight space without having to remove any chart elements.

To use a table as a thermometer chart, do the following:

- 1. On the Insert tab, in the Tables group, click Table and then drag across the grid to select the first two cells in the first row.

Notice the image of the young woman that's within a text column on the preceding page. The background has been removed from that image to allow text to wrap directly around the subject.

- 2. Click in the table and then, on the Table Tools Layout tab, in the Table group, click Properties.
3. On the Columns tab of the Table Properties dialog box, change the Measure In setting to Percentage. You can then set the percentage to up to one decimal point in accuracy.

Setting up multipage articles

Word is designed to allow text to automatically flow from one page to the next. So, when you want an article to continue on the next page, just keep typing.

In the case of this placeholder article, it is separated into two placeholder content controls (one on this page and another that starts at the top of the following page) just so that you can still see the layout of the following page while you begin adding your own text on this page.

To remove the second placeholder control that starts immediately following this one, just select it and then press any key. You can then continue typing from this page and your text will automatically flow onto the next.

Wrap text around images

The photos in this article that are angled with white borders are "floating" images. That is, they are setup for text to wrap around them—which is why they can span multiple columns in a three-column section.

To select text wrap settings, start by selecting the image and then do the following:

- 1. On the Picture Tools Format tab, in the Arrange group, click Wrap Text and then select either Square, Tight, or Top and Bottom—depending on how you want the text to wrap.

Office 2010 introduced several new and improved picture formatting tools in Word, PowerPoint, and Excel. Among those is the Remove Background tool that you can use to remove backgrounds from your own images, similar to the sample image on the preceding page.

You might be happy with the default behavior as soon as you do this. Otherwise, continue to step two for customization options.

- 2. To set a specific position or control behavior (such as whether or not the image moves with text), on the Picture Tools Format tab, in the Arrange group, click Position and then click More Layout Options.

On the Text Wrapping tab of the Layout dialog box, you can set a specific distance from the image for text to wrap and control whether text can wrap on both sides, one side only, or just above and below the image.

On the Position tab of that dialog box, you can set a specific position for the image on the page and select or clear the option to allow the picture to move with text.

Adding article titles, bylines, and dividers

The article titles and bylines for this newsletter are created in text boxes. This is because text can wrap around a text box just like it can around a picture. Similarly, the orange divider bars that you see on pages containing more than one article are shapes set to wrap text.

When you select a text box or a shape, on the Drawing Tools Format tab, in the Arrange group, you have the same settings for text wrapping and positioning that are described above for wrapping text around pictures.

Note that, because text is set to wrap around the orange divider bars, your article might appear to slip below or above a bar, depending upon length. To adjust the position of a divider bar shape to accommodate the length of your articles, just select the shape and then use the up and down arrow keys on your keyboard to nudge it to the proper position.

To do this in Word, first insert your image into the document (on the Insert tab, click Picture), and then select it. Then, on the Picture Tools Format tab, in the Adjust group, click Remove Background.

The Remove Background feature automatically displays what it believes to be the central subject of the image. However, it's easy to adjust this if the immediate result is not what you need.

On the **Background Removal** tab, click **Mark Areas to Keep** or **Mark Areas to Remove** and then drag your mouse pointer in a line across the portion of the image you want to add or remove. When you are finished making adjustments, click **Keep Changes**.

Remove Image Backgrounds

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Caption 2 style is used to add picture captions. Captions are in text boxes for easy placement relative to images.

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
